A LONG wait was over on the 18th of October for the University of Fiji as it finally launched the "Drua Voyage: Climate Change Resilience and Renaissance Project".

The Drua Project is part of a climate change research that aims to lead to societal transformation. It is a collaborative project which involves two other universities from Fiji which are the University of the South Pacific (USP) and Fiji National University (FNU) respectively.

UniFiji's Vice Chancellor, Professor Shaista Shameem said how important this research project is for the present and future generations.

The summary of Our Drua Project is that all Schools and the Centre for iTaukei Studies of the University will jointly embark on a voyage on the Drua which, from March 2023, will sail for a month along the coastal villages near us to research both resilience and renaissance with respect to climate change effects and mitigation'', said Professor Shameem.

Taking into consideration the past and recent events of the world, on top of all that, the ongoing impact of climate change, we are very aware that Universities have a duty to contribute to social change for the public good. That means not just thinking about sustaining all life on our planet but also ensuring we leave a good legacy for the generations to come"

The keynote speaker at the event Ratu Iliesa Cebaivalu, the Taukei Sawaieke, highlighted that The University of Fiji stands on the edge of reclaiming and reconnecting how holistic sustainability was safeguarded for the betterment of all.

For the University of Fiji to journey towards a holistic education that will impact positively in Fiji in the midst of climate change, it needs to go back before it can journey forward," said Ratu Iliesa

# UniFiji Drua to help in combating climate change impacts-Taukei Sawaieke

"LIKE our forefathers who went before us, Pacific people of today need fine vessels to connect us to face this even greater adversity- that of Climate Change which is largely affecting our Pacific Islands," said Iliesa Cebaivalu.

He said that despite the Pacific Islands contributing only 0.03 per cent of total greenhouse gas emissions the impacts are still a threat to our homeland, culture, livelihoods and even our Pacific identity.

The Drua is a well-established vessel that the Pacific Island people need to connect to so that the adversity of climate change can be mitigated.

Here in Vuda, we have experienced first-hand the effect of Climate change with changing weather patterns and conditions, more severe tropical cyclones, hotter temperatures and longer droughts," said Ratu Iliesa.

For the people in Vuda to tackle climate change impacts mangrove planting program and a recent coral planting program with the Vuda Marina has been introduced.

The Drua Project Concept is the brainchild of Unifiji's Vice Chancellor Professor Shaista Shameem where a traditional Fijian drua (canoe) was used to depict the launch, encompassing holistic learning and education for all.

In her address at the Vuda Marina where the drua was put to sea, Dr. Andrea Siodmok, the Chief Impact Officer of the Royal Society of Arts London, expressed her desire to create a future where people, places, and the planet all flourish together and this she said is also the RSA's objective. "I took a student loan and went sailing for two weeks, visiting eleven islands in Santorini, Greece. This became one of the most magical moments of my life."

Dr. Siodmok also shared the three things that are needed to build a better future, and they are knowledge, action, and agency.

These were the sentiments shared by Ms Antonia Watson, Group Chief Executive Officer of ANZ Bank New Zealand, keynote speaker at The University of Fiji's Centre for Women in Leadership's first public event on Wednesday 21 September 2022 at its Samabula Campus.

The theme of Ms Watson's presentation was "Watch Women Win", that was released in New Zealand by ANZ late last year.

Which she spoke on winning as a female leader, her professional journey especially the lessons learnt along the way, and what it meant for all women.


"We launched the Watch Women Win report because we were concerned that there was a lack of confidence, a fear of failure and judgement holding back a lot of young women in sports," said Ms Watson.

"It always seems harder to achieve your dreams if you're a girl, woman, or minority. While the barriers seem the same, so too are the solutions - encouragement, having visible role models, supporting others, and celebrating the steps of success and those already achieving,"

Ms Watson concluded her lecture by discussing values that are essential for leaders. She stated that values are acquired over time and are at the heart of who a person is.

# Expansion of the Gaia landscape project

THE UNIVERSITY of Fiji Gaia Landscape Project Horticultural Coordinator, Tifare Paulo, says his team have managed to raise seedlings of crops, fruit trees and flowers for landscaping since the launch of the project.

Paulo adds the project is also aimed to identify and invest in alternative energy sources so the university can cut back on what it spends on power supply, and set an example to the community on sustainable design and waste management. "There are three beehives at the site, for honey.

"Goals were set to raise pawpaw, oranges, lime and other traditional plants, at the site," Paulo said.

In the meantime, Paulo says the collection of grass and compostable organic wastes for the whole school and ongoing consultation are needed for the location of the compost site, which should be accessible, near a water source and at least 100m from the school.

Vice Chancellor, Professor Shaista Shameem says the project will establish gardens and harvest vegetables that can make UniFiji more sustainable.

Professor Shameem hopes the venture will spread to other campuses, but Samabula Campus also had a vegetable garden

UNIVERSITY of Fiji Vice Chancellor Professor Shaista Shameem says 'wellbeing' is part of the university's five-year strategic focus.


